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A COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF APAMARGA FROM VRINDA MADHAVA, CHAK-RADATTA AND GADA NIGRAHA

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ABSTRACT

Apamarga (Achyranthes aspera Linn.) of the family Amaranthaceae has been explained since ancient times in Ayurveda. The Granthas of the 9th to 12th Century i.e., Vrinda Madhava, Chakradatta and Gada Nigraha were reviewed, and a special emphasis has been done on Apamarga. It was described as both a single herbal formulation and a poly herbal formulation for treating various ailments like Jwara, Prameha, Vatavyadhi, and also helpful in Sukhaprasava. Be it the Gastrointestinal system, Central nervous system, or Excretory system in various diseases, Apamarga was used for curing the disease as well as for preventing them. It is used for Panchakarma procedures also. The very beneficial drug Apamarga, the word itself says it removes all vitiated Doshas from the body. It purifies the body, and having Kaphavatahara properties will pave the way for a better understanding of the drug and better treatment of diseases.

INTRODUCTION

Dravya is one among the *Chikitsa Chathushpada*, without which no treatment is possible. Apamarga has been explained in many *Ayurvedic* classics.

Apamarga means "that which removes all vitiated doshas from the body and purifies it". It grows wildly and is found in tropical and temperate regions. This

readily available plant has many therapeutic indications and will help treat diseases.

Acharya Vrinda wrote Vrinda Madhava in the 9th Century A.D. It is also known as Siddha Yoga, and except for this, no other works of Acharya Vrinda are available; this is a Grantha on treatment that describes one or more diseases in every chapter and their treatments. Here, only herbal drugs are defined for use in preparations. Lauha and Mandura were the only Rasa Aushadhis prescribed for internal use. Not many Rasa Aushadhis were used up to Acharya Vrinda days. Mercury was described only once for external use. Consisting of 82 Adhyayas. It became popular within a short period.

Acharya Chakrapani Datta wrote Chakradatta in the 11th Century A.D., also known as Chikitsa Samgraha, which has 79 Adhyayas. Each Adhyaya focuses on a particular Vyadhi and explains various herbal preparations. It also has many formulations and mercurial preparations. A verse at the end of Chakradatta indicates the text followed Vrinda (Siddha Yoga) making several additions, introducing mercurial preparations, and also the evolution of Rasa Shastra along with Loha Shastra and accepting Tantric practices.

Vaidhya Shodala wrote Gada Nigraha in the 12th Century A.D. This *Grantha* is divided into 3 *Khandas-*1st part is *Prayoga Khanda* with six chapters, 2nd part is *Kayachikitsa Khanda* with 41 chapters, and 3rd part is *Shalakhya Khanda* to *Panchakarma Khanda* all chapters are included in this part, among which *Shalakhya-*5, *Shalya-*10, *Bhoothavidhyatatra-*3, *Kaumarabhritya tantra-*12, *Vishatantra-*9, *Rasayana tantra-*5, *Vajikarana tantra-*1 and *Panchakarma dhikhara khanda-*5 chapters included in total. These formulations and single drug preparations help the *Vaidhyas* in treatment of diseases.

APAMARGA PLANT

Botanical Name: Achyranthes aspera Linn.

Family Name: Amaranthaceae

Vernacular Names:

English name – Prickly Chaff flower; Hindi name – Chirchita, Chirchira, Latjira, Chingchingi, Onga; Sanskrit name – Apamarga; Telugu Name- Antisha, Apamargamu, Uttaraene ; Kannada name – Uttrani,

Uttarani ; Malayalam Name- Katalati, Kadaladi ; Bengali Name- Apang ; Punjabi Name- Puthakanda, Kutri ; Marathi Name- Aghada, Pandhara-aghada ; Tamil Name – Shiru kadaladi, Nayuruvi.

The plant removes all vitiated *doshas* from the body and purifies the body.

Macroscopic Description [2]:

Habitat: The plant grows abundantly in the wild, mainly in tropical and temperate regions. It is found throughout the tropical and warmer regions of the world, up to an altitude of 2100 metres. The plant is found throughout almost all planes of Indian states. It is a gregariously growing shrub as a weed along the roadside grasslands.

Propagation And Cultivation: Commonly found in shady places such as cultivated fields and Chir pine plantations as a weed. It also grows in drier situations but does not tolerate waterlogging. It can be propagated by seeds [3].

Habit: Wild perennial Herb, which grows 30-90cm in height.

Root: Branched Tap Root, Cylindrical, slightly ripped up to 1.0cm in thickness, gradually tapering, rough due to some root scars. Secondary and tertiary roots are present.

Stem: Aerial erects, stiff, angular, branched, hairy, green, herbaceous but woody below; nodes and internodes are prominent on the stem and is violet or pink at nodes.

Leaf: Simple, opposite, obovate or semi orbicular, reticulate venation, are few, usually thick, 3.8 to 6.3 by 2.5 to 4.5 cm, elliptic or obovate, sometimes nearly orbicular, usually round at the apex. Finely and softly, pubescent on both sides, entirely.

Flower: small, Bracteate, bracteolate, bracteoles have spinous tips, complete, actinomorphic, bisexual, Hypogynous, pentamerous tetracyclic green and spinicent, having Spike inflorescence.

Floral formula:

Fruit: An indehiscent achene enclosed within persistent perianth and bracteole.

Seed: Endospermic, sub-cylindric, truncate at the apex, rounded at the base, brown.



Microscopic Description:

Root: The transfer section of the root shows suberised cork cells up to 10 layers. The cortex consists of 4-6 rows of conjunctive parenchymatous tissue. Vessels with simple and bordered pits with helical thickening are present. Tracheids are also present with tapering end walls. Pith is absent^[4].

Stem: T.S. of the stem is quadrangular in shape, irregularly with 6 to 10 ridges, and collenchyma is present under each ridge. Glandular hairs cover the epidermis, and stomata are of rubiaceous type. Idioblasts with prismatic or granular crystals are present. The Pericycle has lignified fibres arranged in discontinuous rings. The vascular tissues have 5-6 rings of xylem with small strands of phloem tissue embedded within them. A pith occupies the central part of the stem with two medullary bundles, either separate or fused. Numerous cells with clusters of calcium oxalate crystals are dispersed in the parenchymatous ground tissue, numerous in the vicinity of the fibrous, conjunctive tissue of the secondary rings [3].

Leaf: The leaf has a normal dorsiventral structure. T.S. through the mid rib shows trichomes of covering and glandular types on the upper and lower epidermis. The trichomes are more numerous in the lower epidermis. Anomocytic types of stomata are present in the upper and lower epidermis. A cuticle covers upper epidemics. Innumerable clusters of calcium oxalate are present in palisade and spongy mesophyll tissue. Stomata are rubiaceous and trichomes glandular. The palisade ratio is 7.3, the stomatal index is 6.5 (upper surface) and 12.4 (lower surface), and the vein-islet number is 9^[3].

Chemical Constituents [3]

Roots: Ecdysone, Ecdysterone, Inokosterone, Oleanolic acid, Glycoside.

Leaves: Isolated chemical compounds of the volatile oil from Achyranthes aspera leaves. Hydroquinone (57.7%) is the chief constituent; others are p-benzo-quinone, spathulenol, nerol, α -ionone, asarone and eugenol. Alkaloids, flavonoids, saponins, tannins and phenolic compounds

Stem: Dihydroxy ketones-36, 37-dihydroxyhenpentacontan-4-one, and Triacontanol, aliphatic alcohol, 17-pentatriacontanol, penta-triaontane, 6-pentatriacontanone, Hexatriacontane, Tritriacontane, tetracontanol-2 ($C_{40}H_{82}O$), 4-methoxyheptatriacont-1-en-10-ol ($C_{33}H_{76}O$), E-sitosterol and spinasterol

Whole Plant: alkaloids, achyranthine and betaine

Seed: saponin A and B, hentriacontane, alkaline substance especially potash.

Fruits: two new saponins, C and D, and oleanolic acid-based saponins.

Useful Part: Panchanga (Whole Plant)

Pharmacological Actions ^[5]: Anti-hypertensive, Anti-microbial^[6], Antidiabetic, Antileprotic, Purgative, Antifungal, Anti-hyperlipidemic, Anti-Arthritic, Analgesic, Neuropharmacologic activity.

Amayika Prayogas:

- 1. Repeated administration of *Apamarga Mula* grinded with honey given with *Tandulodaka* is useful in *Arshas* ^[7]. (Su.Chi.6/13)
- 2. In bleeding piles, Apamarga seeds are taken with rice water [8]. (Sha.Sam.2/5/19)
- 3. In *Bhasmaka* (*Atyagni*)-excessive hunger, gruel prepared out of *Apamarga Beeja*, milk and *Godha Rasa* is effective ^[9]. (Cha.Su.2/33)

Matra-

Kshara-0.5 to 2g Swarasa-10-20ml Mula Churna-3 to 6 g Beeja Churna-3g

Formulations-*Apamarga Kshara, Apamarga taila, Apamargadi varti, Triphaladi taila, Mahapanchagavya Ghritha*

The Apamarga plant has been an essential plant mentioned since *Vedic* times and is readily available. People worship God with this plant in Hindu Culture. Behind this might be the vast number of health benefits it possesses. *Atharvaveda* refers to it as the "Lord of All Plants on Earth" because it can elongate lifespan by wiping away all diseases. It is beneficial in curing diseases caused by thirst, hunger, defects of organs, speech, sterility, physical debility, and all other disorders. (A.V.*Kanda* IV.17.6-8)^[10]

It was also used in *Dinacharya* for *Danta Dhavana*, *Krimighna*, and *Vishaghna* purposes. *Apamarga* has been used for ages and provides the best possible effects to humanity; hence, a special emphasis on *Apamarga* from *Vrinda Madhava*, *Chakradatta*, and *Gada Nigraha* have been placed.

Apamarga was used as a single drug formulation, i.e., Ekamoolika Prayoga, as well as in combination with dravyas as a poly-herbal formulation. Vrinda Madhava, Chakradatta, and Gada Nigraha these Granthas were reviewed.

VRINDA MADHAVA/SIDDHA YOGA (9th Century A.D.)

Vrinda Madhava, or Siddha Yoga, was written by Acharya Vrinda in 800 CE.

Apamarga was mentioned for chikitsa with other dravyas to treat various diseases.

CHAKRADATTA (11th Century A.D.)

Chakradatta was written by *Acharya Chakrapani Dutta*, the well-known *Tikakarta* of *Charaka Samhitha*. It was named *Chikitsa Sangraha*.

Apamarga seeds, leaves, and the whole plant were used for different treatments in Chakradatta, with synonyms like Shikhari, Mayuraka, and Kinihi.

This treatise consists of two parts and 604 formulations, and the Chapters are called *Khanda*.

Apamarga was mentioned in various formulations like *Panchagavya Ghrita*, *Agasthyaharithaki Avaleha* with synonyms like *Apamarga*, *Mayuraka*, *Pratyakpushpi*, *Kharamanjari*.

DISCUSSION

Apamarga (Achyranthes aspera Linn.) is an easily available plant grown wildly, non-toxic, and cost-effectively. It is a very beneficial plant with many uses. The name "Apamarga" explains that it is "the plant which removes all vitiated doshas from the body and purifies the body".

Vrinda Madhava, written by Acharya Vrinda, mentioned Apamarga with 20 references from 18 Adhyayas—especially Shikhari Taila, Nadeyadi Yoga, and Arogya Lavana-like formulations. Acharya

Chakrapani Dutta, in his treatise Chakradatta, noted a total of 22 references of Apamarga from about 19 Adhyayas having Gudapushpadi Gudika Anjana, Ramamanduram, Angaraka Taila and coming to Gada Nigraha, written by Vaidya Sodhala with references of about 47 references from 7 Khandas and 26 Adhyayas with various formulations such as Phaninjaladah Tailam, Drakshadyam Churnam, Shivavarthi Anjana, Vyoshadi yoga, Bruhat Kshaarapaka.

All three Acharyas mentioned Agasthya Haritaki Avaleha. Acharya Vrinda and Acharya Chakrapani Datta mentioned Brihat Panchagavya Ghritha and Pashanabhedhadi Ghrita. Total of 16 Yogas, 1 Ekamoolika Prayoga and 3 Panchakarma Prayoga Yogas are told in Vrinda Madhava. 18 yogas, 3 Ekamoolika and 1 Panchakarma Prayoga Yogas in Chakradatta and 44 yoags, 2 Ekamoolika and 1 Pachakarma Prayoga Yogas told in Gada Nigraha.




Figure No. 1. Showing the Number of References of *Apamarga* in each *Grantha*




Figure No.2. Showing the Number of Formulations in each *Grantha*

In these three texts, Vrinda Madhava, Chakradatta and Gada Nigraha, Apamarga was used as Ekamoolika prayoga and as a drug in formulations. It was indicated in various ailments related to different Human Body Systems. Coming to Gastrointestinal System includes Jwara, Aruchi, Mandagni, Mukharoga, Grahani roga, Prameha, Pleeharoga, Udara, Visuchika, Arshas, Bhagandara, Krimi. The Respiratory System has Hikka, Shwasa, Pancha Kasa, Prathishya, and Nasarsha. Circulatory System-Hridroga. Central Nervous System-Vatavikara, Urustambha, Adyavata, Khudavata, Ghridrasi. Kampavata, Unmada. Apasmara, Devagraha. Urinary System-Ashmari, Asteelika roga, Vatasambhutha Ashmari. Vestibular System-Karnanada, Badhirya. Visual system-Netra-Navam Lochanothkopa, roga. Akshikopa, Nishandhya. Male Reproductive system-Lingasambhootha Arsha. Female Reproductive System-Sukhaprasava. Integumentary System-Vali, Palitha, Khalithya, Sidhma Kushta, Pama, Kilasa, Vrana, Romanthika.

These will help in treatment, management, prevention of occurrence, and making the person Swasthya. Some formulations, like *Agasthya Haritaki Avaleha*, which, on continuous consumption, acts as a Rasayana and *Guduchyadi Rasayana*, mention that if taken within 3 days, a person gets 1000s of *Slokas Khantastha*. Such excellent formulations have been mentioned in these treatises.

CONCLUSION

Apamarga (Achyranthes aspera Linn.) has been mentioned in many of Ayurveda's texts since Vedic times. It came into light and was considered the "Lord of All Plants on Earth", which explains this plant's importance. It grows wildly and is a very much available plant. Having Tiktha, Katu Rasa, Sara, Teekshna Guna, Katu Vipaka, and Ushna Veerya will help treat diseases. It is Kaphavata Shamaka and is helpful in Kaphaja and Vataja types of diseases. Coming to Vrinda Madhava, Chakradatta, and Gada Nigraha these three treatise have explained Apamarga as an Ekamoolika Prayoga in formulations and Panchakarma procedures. Apamarga is used for treating the ailments caused to various systems of the body, such as Gastrointestinal System, Cardiovascular System, Central Nervous System and the Integumentary System. I conclude by saying that in Vrinda Madhava, a total of 20; in Chakradatta, 22; and Gada Nigraha, 47 references of Apamarga have been mentioned, which will help in preventive and curative aspects of diseases.

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
